Thomas G. Rawski, Professor of Economics and History, joined the University of Pittsburgh's faculty in 1985 after fourteen years at the University of Toronto. His research focuses on the development and modern history of China's economy, including studies of China's reform mechanism and achievements, as well as analyses focused on productivity, investment, industry, trade, labor markets, environment, and economic measurement. His publications include books on *Economic Growth and Employment in China*; *Chinese History in Economic Perspective*; *Economic Growth in Prewar China*; *China's Transition to Industrialization*; and *Economics and the Historian*. He is co-editor of recent volumes on *China's Rise and the Balance of Influence in Asia* (with William W. Keller, University of Pittsburgh Press, 2007) and *China's Great Economic Transformation* (with Loren Brandt, Cambridge University Press, 2008).
